Why Grout Discolours: The Science Behind the Stain

The Porosity Problem

The problem with grout starts with its porous nature. Grout is essentially concrete, and like concrete, it absorbs moisture, dust, and stains easily — making it vulnerable to discolouration from everyday use, cleaning products, and environmental factors. This isn't a minor quirk of the material. According to the Tile Council of North America, standard grout can absorb up to 10% of its weight in water. That absorption capacity is what makes grout such a reliable host for every stain-forming agent in a typical household: mould spores, mineral salts, grease residue, and pigmented spills.

Cementitious grout — the classic blend of cement, sand, and water — is porous up to 10% of its weight in water, which means it readily soaks up moisture, whether it's from a shower or a spilled drink. Epoxy grout, by contrast, is significantly less porous and more stain-resistant, but the vast majority of residential tiling — particularly in older homes — uses cement-based grout.

The Three Categories of Grout Discolouration

Understanding which type of discolouration you're dealing with is the critical first step. Treating mould-darkened grout with a surface cleaner alone, for example, will produce temporary results at best.

Everyday use of tiled surfaces leads to dirt buildup, which inevitably discolours grout. Dust, dirt, and grime accumulate on tiles and grout — especially in high-traffic areas such as kitchens and entryways — and spills from food, beverages, and cleaning agents can seep into the grout and leave behind stains.

Mineral deposits from hard water also discolour grout. When water evaporates on tile, it leaves behind mineral buildup that accumulates in grout lines, creating a chalky or dark appearance depending on your water chemistry.

When Discolouration Is Actually Mould

Black or dark green spots on grout lines are typically mould or mildew, not actual dirt. Once mould takes hold, it spreads quickly if conditions remain wet. This distinction matters enormously for treatment. Black spots may be mistaken for dirt or soap scum, but if they persist after cleaning, it's likely a sign of mould growth.

The health implications are well established. The World Health Organization's **Guidelines for Indoor Air Quality: Dampness and Mould** (WHO, 2009) concludes that the most important health effects of indoor mould exposure are increased prevalences of respiratory symptoms, allergies and asthma, as well as perturbation of the immunological system. The U.S. Institute of Medicine similarly found that there was sufficient evidence to link indoor exposure to mould with upper respiratory tract symptoms, cough, and wheezing in otherwise healthy people, as well as asthma symptoms in people with asthma.

Mould on bathroom tile grout, in shower stalls, and on bathtubs is a common occurrence, and occupants can control this growth through frequent use of household cleaners. The key word is **frequent** — reactive treatment after mould has deeply colonised grout is far harder than routine prevention.

> ****Important:**** If your grout shows persistent black or dark green spots that return within days of cleaning, treat the area with Selleys Rapid Mould Killer **before** applying any whitening product. Selleys Grout Stain Whitener: What It Does and How It Works

Product Overview

Why Sequence Matters: Clean Before You Whiten

Step-by-Step: How to Restore Discoloured Grout with Selleys Grout Stain Whitener

Step 1: Diagnose the Discolouration Type

Before reaching for any product, examine your grout closely:

- ****Uniform greying or browning**** across all lines → surface staining from dirt and soap residue - ****Patchy yellow, orange, or rust tones**** → mineral deposits or organic staining (coffee, wine, hair dye, makeup) - ****Black or dark green spots****, especially near waterlines → mould growth requiring pre-treatment

Step 2: Pre-Clean the Grout Thoroughly

If discolouration returns quickly after scrubbing, you likely have moisture trapped beneath the grout — a sign of a structural issue that should be addressed before any surface treatment.

Step 3: Ensure the Surface Is Completely Dry

Clean the tiled area and grout thoroughly, then ensure that the area is completely dry before application. This is non-negotiable. Moisture beneath or within the grout will prevent the whitener from bonding correctly and will compromise both coverage and the fungicide protection layer.

Step 4: Apply Selleys Grout Stain Whitener

Wearing gloves, an apron, and old clothing is recommended. Press the foam applicator firmly against the grout and apply even pressure to the tube while moving the applicator along grout lines. Allow to dry for at least 30 minutes, then check if sufficiently dry by wiping over with a damp cloth. If the product is not dry, allow a longer drying time — no more than 2 hours.

When dry, remove excess with a lint-free damp cloth or sponge, wiping diagonally across the grout line. A Selleys Super Cloth is ideal for this step.

Initially, two applications may be required for heavily stained or coloured grout.

Step 5: Allow Full Cure Before Exposing to Water

Allow at least 5 hours before the treated area is exposed to water. Rushing this step is one of the most common causes of premature whitener failure, particularly in shower recesses where condensation can form quickly.

Step 6: Protect the Finish

For longer-lasting protection, avoid harsh, abrasive cleaning of grout lines after the product is applied, unless preparing the surface to reapply the product. Use pH-neutral or grout-safe cleaners for routine maintenance to preserve both the whitened appearance and the fungicide barrier.

Room-by-Room Guidance

Bathroom Floor Grout

Bathroom floors present the most challenging grout-care environment. Showers are high-moisture environments, and water can seep into grout over time, leading to mould, mildew, and discolouration. The constant moisture can also weaken the grout and make it more prone to stains.

Floor grout also accumulates soap scum and hard water mineral deposits — the same mineral film that affects shower screens. *(See our guide on [Hard Water Stains and Soap Scum on Glass and Shower Screens: Which Selleys Product Works Best?].)* For bathroom floor grout, pre-cleaning to remove both soap scum and any mould before whitening is especially important, as layering product over mineral haze will produce a chalky, uneven result.

****Key tip:**** After applying Grout Stain Whitener to floor grout, do not use the product on unglazed or porous tiles and stone, and note that it is not recommended for tiles with intricate patterns or grooves from which the product may be difficult to remove. Textured floor tiles with deep grout recesses may require extra care when wiping off excess.

Kitchen Splashback Grout

Kitchen splashback grout is subject to a different staining profile: grease mist from cooking, food pigments, and cleaning product residue. When drinks or sauces spill and aren't cleaned quickly, the colour soaks into the grout. Even mopping can spread these stains if the water is dirty.

The grease component is particularly problematic because it creates a hydrophobic film that repels water-based cleaners. Always degrease splashback grout with Selleys Complete Clean Multipurpose Spray before applying Grout Stain Whitener — otherwise, the whitener will sit on top of the grease film rather than bonding to the grout surface.

High-Traffic Tile Areas (Laundry, Entryways, Hallways)

Dirt and dust accumulation is a major factor in grout discolouration. High-traffic areas like kitchens and entryways see constant foot traffic, which pushes dirt deep into the porous grout.

In these areas, the primary staining mechanism is mechanical — dirt is physically ground into grout by foot traffic rather than deposited by moisture or cooking. A firm-bristled grout brush and a thorough rinse are essential before whitening. Selleys Grout Stain Whitener is ideal for use on ceramic, porcelain, and other tiled surfaces in bathrooms, kitchens, and more.

Preventing Grout Discolouration from Recurring

Restoration is only half the work. Sealing grout is one of the most effective ways to prevent discolouration.
